# MINNS DELAYS PROTECTIONS FOR WOMEN AND CHILDREN IN THE TAMWORTH ELECTORATE

The NSW Opposition is calling on the Minns Labor Government to take strong and urgent action on domestic violence, after it delayed strengthening the state's bail laws.

Liberal and Nationals MPs were prepared to push the Government's new bail bill through Parliament this week, in order to increase protections for women and children as soon as possible.

But Labor and the Greens refused to back the move, which means the changes won't be looked at for at least another month. NSW Nationals Leader Dugald Saunders said we need swift and decisive action when it comes to addressing the scourge of gendered violence gripping the state. "We all know the shameful statistics that almost 30 women have lost their lives at the hands of a former or current partner this year, and our communities are calling for help," Mr Saunders said. "The Government didn't want to work with us on our proposed bill last week, and now it doesn't want to work with us on its own proposal this week, which begs the question, what are we waiting for? Every day that goes past is another day that women in NSW go unprotected."

Member for Tamworth Kevin Anderson said the Premier needs to put people's needs before politics. "We have heard of the tragedies that have occurred across NSW and we have also seen similar experiences here," Mr Anderson said. "We know it can be harder for women to leave abusive relationships when the live in the country because they often have nowhere else to go and we simply can't continue to sit on our hands. The women in our community want us to work together on this issue, but unfortunately we aren't seeing the level of bipartisanship or urgency from the Government that we need to deal with this important issue."



Meet the candidates for the upcoming North West Local Land Services board member election. Re the National Australia Bank (NAB), formerly the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney Ltd (CBC): The CBC was established in 1834 and came to Barraba in 1876. My father and his father - and my aunt - and probably my great grandparents; all banked with the CBC as did so many people around Barraba and Bingara.

I am pleased that I never banked with the CBC or the NAB, and I have no intention of doing so. The bank rewarded its loyal customers in the regions by abandoning them. If the customers are supposed to be able to do everything at the Post Office that they used to do in person at the bank, how come they need to travel to the branch in Gunnedah?

I think that is very unfair on those who can't do internet banking. It is not illegal to not have or want a credit or debit card or keycard. I suggest people transfer their funds to the Regional Australia Bank which supports local projects and at least is open for a few hours twice a week.

### Message from the Mayor




This week the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) approved our Special Rate Variation (SRV) application. We sought a permanent SRV of 36.3% over two years - with an 18.5 per cent increase from 1 July 2024-25 (including the rate peg of

4.9%) and 15% in 2025-26 (including the forecast 2.5% rate peg). Councillors will decide in June whether or not to implement the approved increases.

Of course, no one in our community will be happy about rates going up. However, IPART's approval does recognise our application was sound.

The IPART put our financial modelling under the microscope and found that without a Special Variation our financial position would be unsustainable. Council will use two-thirds of the additional income on roadworks. Importantly, we have updated our financial hardship policy and we will have an additional concession of \$100 for eligible pensioners over the 2-year Special Variation period.

#### **Council meeting update**

# Here is an overview of outcomes from Tamworth Regional Council Ordinary Meeting on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> May 2024:

- Councillors have given the green light for work to continue on detailed design of the proposed Tamworth Regional Aquatic Centre and Northern Inland Centre of Sport and Health. Tonight, they approved in principle the proposed concept design and authorised Council's General Manager to submit a development application for the project. Council proposes to develop a major aguatics and sports health centre at the Tamworth Sports and Entertainment Precinct with a total budget of \$45 million. Artist renders of the concept designs were included in a report table at tonight's meeting. The design features a state-of-the-art 50m indoor pool with a 1.2m fixed shallow end, moveable floor in the deep end to provide 1.2m to 2m depth, and a central swim wall to allow the pool to be set up as a 50m pool, 25m pool or a combination of both. The project is designed to be delivered in stages as funding becomes available. Council has secured \$15 million for the project from the NSW Government and has applied for funding from the Australian Government. A future report will be presented to Council with a detailed funding strategy for their consideration.
- Councillors agreed to place the Draft Integrated Planning and Reporting suite of documents for 2024/2025 on public exhibition for 28 days. They include drafts of 'Our Annual Plan and Budget 2024/2025', 'Statement of Revenue Policy 2024/2025' and 'Fees and Charges 2024/2025'. Each year Council invites community feedback about the documents which guides our community activities, projects and services to be delivered in the coming financial year before they are adopted at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 25 June 2024. The 2024/25 Annual Plan and Budget is different from previous years because of the Special Rate Variation recently approved by IPART and if implemented by Council in June the increase will take place from 1 July 2024. The Plan includes two financial scenarios:
- One budget based on a rate rise of 18.5 percent (13.6% increase and 4.9% rate peg). This will enable Council to continue to deliver the services and projects our community has told us they want and need.
- An alternative budget if Council does not implement the SRV, limiting the rise of rates income to the annual rate peg of 4.9% for 2024/25, would result in Council not being able to deliver the projects identified to address key areas of asset backlog, particularly in sport and

- recreation (including pools), stormwater, roads and buildings.
- Councillors reviewed the minutes of the Tamworth Regional Community Safety Working Group February meeting and the request from the Working Group that Council consider the role that it can play in supporting the establishment of a residential drug and alcohol rehabilitation facility in the region. Tonight, Councillors agreed to undertake a review of Council owned land to determine any sites which may be suitable for the facility, as well as investigating funding options for the development of a business plan and writing to the NSW Premier, NSW Minister for Health and the local State Member to advocate for the service.
- Councillors endorsed a report from Tamworth Regional Local Traffic Committee which included recommendations to approve modification works at the intersection of Goonan and Marathon Streets in Westdale, a footpath crossing over Elbergs Gully, Bendemeer, reducing Havannah Street, Bendemeer to one lane of traffic across the low level bridge to improve the safety of pedestrians, relocating No Stopping signs at the intersection of Johnston and Smith streets in North Tamworth and moving a disabled parking space on White Street, Tamworth closer to Peel Street.
- Tamworth Baseball Incorporated will be hosting the largest baseball carnival in the southern hemisphere once again over the June long weekend, and Council has agreed to waive the fees associated with running it. With the event expected to host over 900 players at Tamworth's Riverside Sporting Complex and give a projected economic boost of \$929,000 to the region, a complete fee waiver of \$6,035 will be granted under the Sports Event Subsidisation Policy.
- Councillors have adopted an updated Public Art Policy and now community feedback is being sought on the draft Tamworth Region Public Art Strategy. The strategy will be on exhibition for 28 days. The Public Art Strategy will be used by Council to govern inception, coordination, installation, maintenance and ongoing management of public art in the Tamworth region. A number of Councillors spoke in support of increasing the Public Art Fund by \$26,000 in the 2024-25 budget. The fund has not been increased since 2015.
- ➤ Tamworth Region Mayor Russell Webb was formally endorsed by his fellow Councillors to nominate for the position of chair for the Murray Darling Association Region 11. The next board meeting will be on Thursday this week in Tamworth.



Timothy Schmidt, Professor of Chemistry, UNSW Sydney

Earlier this month, a huge solar flare sent a wave of energetic particles from the Sun surging out through space. Over the weekend, the wave reached Earth, and people around the world enjoyed the sight of unusually vivid aurora in both hemispheres. While the aurora is normally only visible close to the poles, this weekend it was spotted as far south as Hawaii in the northern hemisphere, and as far north as Mackay in the south.

This spectacular spike in auroral activity appears to have ended, but don't worry if you missed out. The Sun is approaching the peak of its 11-year sunspot cycle, and periods of intense aurora are likely to return over the next year or so. If you saw the aurora, or any of the photos, you might be wondering what exactly was going on. What makes the glow, and the different colours? The answer is all about atoms, how they get excited — and how they relax.

#### When electrons meet the atmosphere

The auroras are caused by charged subatomic particles (mostly electrons) smashing into Earth's atmosphere. These are emitted from the Sun all the time, but there are more during times of greater solar activity. Most of our atmosphere is protected from the influx of charged particles by Earth's magnetic field. But near the poles, they can sneak

in and wreak havoc. Earth's atmosphere is about 20% oxygen and 80% nitrogen, with some trace amounts of other things like water, carbon dioxide (0.04%) and argon.

When high-speed electrons smash into oxygen molecules in the upper atmosphere, they split the oxygen molecules ( $O_2$ ) into individual atoms. Ultraviolet light from the Sun does this too, and the oxygen atoms generated can react with  $O_2$  molecules to produce ozone ( $O_3$ ), the molecule that protects us from harmful UV radiation.

But, in the case of the aurora, the oxygen atoms generated are in an excited state. This means the atoms' electrons are arranged in an unstable way that can "relax" by giving off energy in the form of light.

#### What makes the green light?

As you see in fireworks, atoms of different elements produce different colours of light when they are energised. Copper atoms give a blue light, barium is green, and sodium atoms produce a yellow—orange colour that you may also have seen in older street lamps. These emissions are "allowed" by the rules of quantum mechanics, which means they happen very quickly. When a sodium atom is in an excited state it only stays there for around 17 billionths of a second before firing out a yellow—orange photon. But, in the aurora, many of the oxygen atoms are created in excited states with no "allowed" ways to relax by emitting light. Nevertheless, nature finds a way.

The green light that dominates the aurora is emitted by oxygen atoms relaxing from a state called "¹S" to a state called "¹D". This is a relatively slow process, which on average takes almost a whole second.

In fact, this transition is so slow it won't usually happen at the kind of air pressure we see at ground level, because the excited atom will have lost energy by bumping into another atom before it has a chance to send out a lovely green photon. But in the atmosphere's upper reaches, where there is lower air pressure and therefore fewer oxygen molecules, they have more time before bumping into one another and therefore have a chance to release a photon.

For this reason, it took scientists a long time to figure out that the green light of the aurora was coming from oxygen atoms. The yellow—orange glow of sodium was known in the 1860s, but it wasn't until the 1920s that Canadian scientists figured out the auroral green was due to oxygen.

#### What makes the red light?

The green light comes from a so-called "forbidden" transition, which happens when an electron in the oxygen atom executes an unlikely leap from one orbital pattern to another. (Forbidden transitions are much less probable than allowed ones, which means they take longer to occur.)

However, even after emitting that green photon, the oxygen atom finds itself in yet another excited state with no allowed relaxation. The only escape is via another forbidden transition, from the <sup>1</sup>D to the <sup>3</sup>P state – which emits red light.

This transition is even more forbidden, so to speak, and the <sup>1</sup>D state has to survive for about about two minutes before it can finally break the rules and give off red light. Because it takes so long, the red light only appears at high altitudes, where the collisions with other atoms and molecules are scarce. Also, because there is such a small amount of oxygen up there, the red light tends to appear only in intense

auroras – like the ones we have just had. This is why the red light appears above the green. While they both originate in forbidden relaxations of oxygen atoms, the red light is emitted much more slowly and has a higher chance of being extinguished by collisions with other atoms at lower altitudes.

#### Other colours, and why cameras see them better

While green is the most common colour to see in the aurora, and red the second most common, there are also other colours. In particular, ionised nitrogen molecules ( $N_2^+$ , which are missing one electron and have a positive electrical charge), can emit blue and red light. This can produce a magenta hue at low altitudes. All these colours are visible to the naked eye if the aurora is bright enough. However, they show up with more intensity in the camera lens.

There are two reasons for this. First, cameras have the benefit of a long exposure, which means they can spend more time collecting light to produce an image than our eyes can. As a result, they can make a picture in dimmer conditions. The second is that the colour sensors in our eyes don't work very well in the dark – so we tend to see in black and white in low light conditions. Cameras don't have this limitation. Not to worry, though. When the aurora is bright enough, the colours are clearly visible to the naked eye.
