It was an early start for the Stage 6 Agriculture class on Wednesday 8th May, when they left at 6am to make the 11 hour trip to Rockhampton for 2024 Beef Week. On our journey, we learnt facts about Goondiwindi, Condamine and Banana as well as playing some competitive eye spy, answering Ag questions and sleeping. When we arrived in Rocky, we set off on our first group shopping trip before continuing the last hour to Byfield where our accommodation was. Our accommodation at Castle Rock Farm consisted of dorm style accommodation for the boys and glamping on the Eco deck for the girls. We had open showers with views of the rain forest, a fire pit and an amazing communal kitchen and entertainment area which hosted our first dinner of Pizza.

The second day consisted of bacon and egg rolls for breakfast and a hot dog production line for lunches. We headed into Rocky for the first day of Beef Week where we had an amazing day walking around all the stalls and cattle sheds at beef week, learning about the history of different breeds of beef cattle. The students had conversations with Universities, agricultural experts and reps which were unfortunately cut short due to some humid coastal rain conditions making our day pretty wet. After another quick shopping trip and frequenting the honesty box roadside stalls for pineapples, we headed home for Spag Bowl, garlic bread and Cobens ag excursion tradition of fire baked cinnamon and sugar pineapples.

Day 3 saw us have a slow start with breakfast and then heading back into Rocky for day two of Beef week. We saw many things that some of us missed on day 2, which included the technology in Agriculture tent and demos of horsemen and cattle breeds. After lunch we headed over to the coastal town of Yeppoon where the students had a chance to swim in the man-made lagoon and a quick dip in the ocean until Amie and Mrs Bennett remembered we are in croc territory and swiftly removed the students from the water. History Rotes

What a surprise to find the Court House all fenced in and workmen actually attending to

the building this week. It is now sometime since the pigeons and the vegetation were removed so it is nice to see something actually happening to one of the oldest buildings in Barraba.

The Court house is one of the oldest buildings in our town the old school in Cherry Street, is probably just older, as is the Post Office which was opened in 1882, while the hospital is younger.

We have two "Festival Booklets" printed in 1946 and 1983 but neither of them has much information about the Court House so I resorted to the Witten Diary and found some information although no actual date or official opening appears.

Arthur Witten took the contract to "draw bricks for the Court House" on 25th March, 1881, and a week later there is a note in the diary "23,400 bricks carted for the Court House." Four days later we read "25,200 bricks carted by Charley and Hubert which finished the kiln of bricks."

A few days later the courthouse contractor returned Turpin (the draft horse) and Arthur Witten sold Turpin two days later to Mr. Lee for 15 pounds. On 19th April, 1881 Daly started carting bricks again and noted four days later that 4,000 bricks had been carted.

The diary noted on 28th May, "finished bricks for the Court House".

Unfortunately, the diary does not mention when the actual building was finished or when court cases were moved to the Court House.

Reading on I find that the debt was paid off the church on 2ih October, 1881- this is of course the old Anglican Church which stood near the corner of Queen and Alice streets and which was demolished in 1905 and rebuilt as the Parish Hall in Maude Street. The Post Office, next to the Court House was opened on 18th November, 1882, and had several additions before finally being removed to the present site, diagonally opposite the old site. The present Regional Bank is now on the southern side of the Court House.

I wonder if anyone has an idea to use the old Court House the old court room would make a wonderful Galleryperhaps a new version of Frost Over Barraba in spring!! There are several rooms in the old building and the remains of a sizeable kitchen for catering. It is a shame that the building has remained empty since the S.E.S. left it. Bill Bright was one citizen who thought it would make a wonderful gallery and often spoke about the waste leaving it empty.

Warialda set to transform into a beef production hub this June

North West Beef Producers Forum

Warialda Memorial Hall, 72 Hope Street Warialda NSW

Run by North West Local Land Services since 2017, the event offers local beef producers the opportunity to hear from leading industry research agencies and practical advice from top primary producers in the region.



Naomi Hobson, Land Services Officer said that this year's line-up of speakers was not to be missed, showcasing significant new research coming out of the sector. "We're really excited by the calibre of the presentations that will be given at the event this year," she said. "The event is shaping up to be a great mix of both new insights and advice born of years of experience in beef production", said Ms Hobson.

This year the event will feature presentations from Meat & Livestock Australia (Mr David Packer), AgSTAR Projects (Callen Thompson) and Texas Angus (Ben and Wendy Mayne) in addition to District Vet Dr Ted Irwin and Dr Alex Ball with Tom Ledingham.

Attendees can expect to hear about heifer artificial insemination and opportunities for genomic selection in commercial herds, optimising feed base for maximum productivity, seasonal animal health advice, pasture dieback and building resilience in farm business operations.

Sally Balmain, Land Services Officer said strong interest in the beef market as a whole brought an opportunity to focus on the end consumer as well this year. "This year's forum will include a presentation from Darren Keyte of Smo-King BBQ Inverell, who will be discussing the beef market from a butcher's point of view", she said. Smo-King BBQ will also cater the event, treating attendees to the rich smoky taste of slow cooked barbecue beef. Tickets are available at a cost of \$40 per person. Strategy focused on diverse and affordable housing

Providing a framework to ensure the Tamworth region will have well-designed housing to meet the needs of a diverse and growing community and provide a wide range of lifestyle and affordability options is the aim of the draft Tamworth Regional Housing Strategy.

Councillors will consider the strategy at TRC Ordinary Meeting where they are expected to approve its public exhibition to give the local community the chance to have their say.

Tamworth Region Mayor Russell Webb said the local region is not immune to the housing challenges being experienced throughout NSW and across Australia and the draft strategy includes measures designed to ease some of those pain points. "Availability of a range of different housing types which is also affordable is essential," he said. "Council has been working hard for our community to develop a plan to try and meet the needs of our growing community and especially those crying out for help. "Affordability pressure is being felt more in large metropolitan centres but residents of our region are also feeling it."

The strategy has five key priorities and 29 proposed actions. The identified priorities are:

Provide for sustainable growth supported by infrastructure;

Increase diversity and choice in housing;

Improve housing affordability and reduce housing costs;

P Facilitate liveable communities; and

Promote rural communities.

The strategy has been developed with the benefit of wideranging consultation with presentations to the Tamworth Economic Forum Breakfast, a Developers Forum; a briefing to the Tamworth City Centre Working group, workshops with Council staff and Councillors and direct consultation with the local real estate industry and an online community survey which received 351 contributions.

Should Councillors approve placing the draft strategy on exhibition, community feedback will be received from Monday 3 June until Monday 1 July. All feedback will inform a report to Council in early August when Councillors will consider the formal adoption of the strategy.
